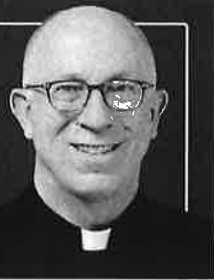

YEAR OF THE AMORIS LAETITIA FAMILY

This is a year of years: it's the Year of St. Joseph, the Year of Laudato Si, and the Year of the Amoris Laetitia Family. Italians would say: Diego Maradona, that's a lot of celebration!

A few words about the Year of the Amoris Laetitia Family. It begins on 19 March 2021, the Feast of St. Joseph, Husband of Mary, and the foster father of Jesus, our Savior.

Remember? Amoris Laetitia was written by Pope Francis (viva il Papa!) to promote thought and discussion on marriage and family; this anniversary observance has the same purpose.

If you haven't read it, do yourself a favor. Chapters Three and Four are worth a read, and accessible, even if we're not married or theologians.

Marriage. We understand it as an institution that began with creation, whereby man and woman freely give themselves to each other until death in a faithful and fruitful relationship.

All of us have a vested interest in safeguarding marriage and family,

because when these are healthy and strong, so are our Nation and its citizens.

For example, spouses and their children enjoy greater physical and economic wellbeing, as well as fewer instances of domestic violence and anti-social behavior.

Also, studies show people more likely experience joy and a filled-full life when they live for another, serve and sacrifice for another – what you learn in and from marriage and family.

You get the point: marriage and family have a place and purpose independent of religious teaching. Jesus only restored the original plan of creation, and sanctified married love.

We need more vocations to priesthood. But there's also a need for vocations to marriage and family life; if this were to increase, there'd be an increase in the number of priests too.

Because the best way to learn the service and sacrifice involved in being a follower of Jesus is the witness of spouse to spouse, parents to children, children as future... priests?

Please, God, let the Year of the Amoris Laetitia Family be more than a passing observance, and bear the fruit of more people entering Holy Matrimony, a community of life and love.

JOHNSON & JOHNSON COVID-19 VACCINE

Originally, it didn't seem necessary to make a statement about the Johnson and Johnson (Janssen) vaccine; any message would be essentially the same as what was said in December 2020 regarding the other vaccines.

However, some Catholics are a little confused about whether they may receive the Johnson and Johnson vaccine. So, some clarification is called for:

If Catholics are given a choice about which COVID vaccine to receive, they should choose the Pfizer or Moderna vaccines over the Johnson and Johnson vaccine. Why?

Because Johnson and Johnson used cell lines from the fetal tissue of an aborted baby in the production of its vaccine, whereas Pfizer and Moderna used them only for lab testing.

It's a subtle distinction. All three companies used those ethically compromised cell lines; it's just that the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines, because they made only limited use, are further removed from the evil of abortion than is the Johnson and Johnson vaccine.

However, if Catholics are not given a choice about which vaccine to receive, it is morally acceptable for them to use the Johnson and Johnson vaccine against the serious health risk of the coronavirus.

In this regard, it appears that, at present, and for the foreseeable future, no one is

being offered a choice of vaccines.

Besides, as stated above, right now there isn't a COVID vaccine available that didn't use those abortion-derived cell lines in design, development, production, and/or lab testing.

So, if Catholics have the opportunity to get vaccinated, and aren't given a choice of vaccines, they should gratefully receive whatever is available; the sooner, the better.

The common good of protecting the public health against a contagious and potentially deadly virus takes precedence over any reservations Catholics might have about being treated with any of the available vaccines.
